No surprise here --- I bought them!



Amber is fossilized resin and Chiapas amber is particular sought after for its color and inclusions. This photo shows how it is found in the mines.

And men selling amber jewelry will find you - no problem. We lucked out in that it is market day in the mountain town of San Juan Chamula and vendors are out in full force.



But when you talk with a lovely Tzotzil woman crocheting hats, bags and toys; when you meet the man who sculpts traditional figures from the same stone the Mayans built their cities; and when you run across beautifully hand-made silver items. Well.... its hard to resist. At least I didn't have to buy an extra suitcase to get all my stuff home this time!
